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

Afterschool Conversation Starters

Avoid These Questions	Try These Instead
How was school?	What's the biggest difference between this year and last year?
Did you have fun at school?	What was the best thing you did at school today?
Who did you sit with?	Tell me the names of the four boys who sat closest to you.
Is your (subject) teacher nice?	What was the most interesting thing a teacher said today?
Were you okay at school today?	How did you help somebody today? How did somebody help you today?
Was school interesting today?	Tell me one thing that you learned today
Did your teacher go over the homework with the class?	What was the best question you asked today? What was the best question you heard today?
Did you have everything you needed for school?	Was there anything you wish you had at school that you didn't have today?

Remember: Teach your son to expect success.

"When Winston Churchill was a child, his report card said he was 'a constant trouble to everybody' and couldn't be 'trusted to behave himself anywhere.' That same boy grew up to be the greatest Prime Minister. He believed in himself and worked really hard to get there."

Seven Practical Things to help:

- 1. Check and sign the diary every week.
- 2. Download Firefly App and use to check work set/ progress
- 3. Provide a quiet, desk space with a light and paper for private study.
- Support him with personal organisation! Read coursework/homework (if possible) and help your son with projects and especially assist by insisting on filing well.
- Buy additional reading materials/study guides for subjects and encourage independent learning.
- 6. Discuss topics around the table that he is studying in school.
- 7. Be positive with your son. Support is vital to success.





- · Hand it in on time.


Don't fall in the homework trap!

- 5 homework concerns will result in an Academic detention on a Friday afternoon and a letter home.





A note on...

GCSE 'Access' Arrangements

- Rules are set by 'Joint Council for Qualifications'
- Different than those for AQE/GL
- Must meet 3 criteria
 - Difficulties substantially impact on teaching and learning in the classroom
 - At significant disadvantage compared to others
 - In bottom 16% of the population in speed of processing
- Or Medical including ASD and ADHD



Testing

 Must be conducted by schools' Specialist Assessor

No earlier than Year 10

 Private Psychology reports are not admissible (unless requested by School).




Monitoring

- 1. Progress Test in English baseline testing
- 2. Internal school exam results




Careers Education, Information, Advice and Guidance (CEIAG)

- One period of CLG/LLW on timetable every fortnight (Career and Learning Guidance/Learning for Life and Work).
- Investigate potential opportunities and pathways at Level 3 (Post-16 education/training) and beyond; pupils need to be fully aware of *possibilities* and requirements in order to set realistic but aspirational goals.
- Develop mindset for success and enhance employability skills.




National Qualifications Framework – progression routes

By continuing into further and higher level education you can greatly increase your earnings potential and employment prospects.






